It is with great pride that we present **Tomorrow Today's Annual Report for** 2024/25.

CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE OFFICER REPORT

Tomorrow Today is part of the growing network of community foundations across Australia. Each one is unique, reflecting the diversity of needs and strengths within our communities. One of the features that community foundations have in common is the ability to unlock assets of all kinds from within a community, to help create a brighter future. These assets are not just financial but include networks, trust and aspiration. We are grateful that our community so generously supports Tomorrow Today with all these assets.

The Education Benalla Program is a whole-of-community approach to improving educational outcomes for Benalla's young people. Unfortunately, the rising incidence of developmental and learning difficulties amongst young children is a significant problem nationally. Early intervention is critical to future learning and to the wellbeing of these children and their families. For regional families, access to timely specialist assessment and care is not only costly but access can be challenging as there is no publicly funded service. We have been able to negotiate to have a private paediatrician from North East Children's Clinic consult one day per month in Benalla, increasing access for all local families. In addition, working in partnership with preschools and primary schools, we have introduced a 12-month pilot program to "fund the gap" for paediatrician appointments. As a result, local families facing financial hardship can now access the specialist care their children need.

By the time the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal (FRRR) Back-to-School voucher program reached its scheduled conclusion in 2024, it had contributed \$350,000 to Benalla over 20 years. A wonderful contribution to our community. We are extremely grateful to the generous local donors whose recent support has allowed us to continue this program in Benalla and district, purchasing \$30,000 of vouchers for our schools to distribute when and where they are needed.

Through our Annual Grants Program and responsive Stepping Stones Grants, we were pleased to award funding to 19 local organisations, our largest distribution since our grants began in 2003. Almost \$63,000 was invested into community-led projects that build capacity, strengthen resilience, and support the education of Benalla's children and young people. The support of these projects is only possible because of the generosity of the people who contribute to our Community Fund.

This year we commenced two new initiatives within the Education Benalla Program: Motiv8 and Anganya. Motiv8 has been designed to improve the wellbeing of Year 8 students in response to the need identified as part of our program evaluation. Through hands-on activities with residents at Estia Health and members of Benalla SES, participants develop stronger collaborative skills, both with their peers and the wider community.

Anganya, a partnership with Ganbina in Shepparton, supports the learning of Benalla's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. In its first year, the program has already reached more than 50 students who identify as Indigenous. Anganya works with local Elders to deliver cultural learning sessions, provides one-on-one tutoring in key learning areas, and assists secondary students as they plan their career pathways. We are pleased to see the program also making use of Benalla's Aboriginal Garden for informal gatherings and cultural activities led by local Elders.

Tomorrow Today has been involved in the development of the Aboriginal Garden from the first discussions over 20 years ago. It is a place for sharing, healing and knowledge, which continues to evolve in its role as a community resource. This year we established an advisory committee, which includes local Elders and community members, to guide our work in its continued development, ensuring the Garden acknowledges and respects the traditional custodians of the land while serving as a place of connection and learning for all.

We extend our sincere thanks to our dedicated staff, who continue to deliver programs and support to the Benalla community with professionalism, respect and compassion. Thanks also for the commitment of our volunteer Board directors, whose strong governance and strategic leadership guide the organisation with clarity and purpose. This year we were pleased to welcome Rosie Koop to the Board, who many will know from her past role as Tomorrow Today Executive Officer.

We are equally grateful for the contribution made by more than 100 local volunteers whose time, energy and goodwill make our work possible. The success of our programs is a direct reflection of their commitment to supporting the children and families of our community.

Finally, we wish to acknowledge the generosity of our donors, partners, funders and community supporters. Their ongoing belief in our vision of creating a bright future for Benalla strengthens and sustains our work. A special mention of our partnership with The Ian Potter Foundation. Their announcement of a new five-year commitment will result in 20 years of support for the Education Benalla Program and Tomorrow Today.

Looking ahead, we remain committed to ensuring that Tomorrow Today continues to build opportunities for children and families, strengthen community connections, and respond to emerging challenges with innovation and care. Together with our volunteers and supporters, we are confident in our shared ability to create lasting, positive change for our community.

BENALLA'S **COMMUNITY FUND**

The Community Fund exists to give back to Benalla and district by turning local generosity into lasting impact. Donations are pooled and carefully invested, with the income used to provide grants that strengthen and support our community. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, we're able to fund a range of local projects year after year that help build a more connected, resilient, and thriving rural community.

Over \$1.6 million is held in Benalla's Community Fund.

NAMED FUNDS

Some donors choose to establish a Named Fund to give ongoing support to a particular charitable cause that's important to them. These special accounts within the Community Fund are managed by Tomorrow Today to track donations and grants for a particular donor or cause.

Current Named Funds that are benefiting our community:

Education Fund - supports young people to access educational opportunities.

Kingston Smith Memorial Fund - established in memory of local toddler Kingston Smith. This Fund supports early intervention programs that enhance the education, health and wellbeing of young children in need.

Lonsdale Fund - provides financial support for young people whose educational opportunities are limited by alcohol or drug use within the family unit.

Sir Edward 'Weary' Dunlop Memorial Fund - this fund was established in 2024 to support students in Years 10-12 to access educational opportunities.

SUPPORTING OUR COMMUNITY

In the 2024/25 financial year Tomorrow Today distributed \$123,136 in funding to groups, families and individuals across Benalla and district.

Support for children and young people in families experiencing financial hardship I \$60,234

Education, Sport and Hobbies I \$30,234

Through funding from philanthropic grants, BPACC Scholarship Fund, Education Fund and Lonsdale Fund, we supported 131 children and young people to access items including shoes and clothing, spectacles, travel and paediatric appointments; or participate in sport and recreation activities and school excursions. A further six students received Year 12 Scholarships.

Through the support of the Kingston Smith Memorial Fund, the Education Benalla Program has been able to invest in highquality, evidence-based resources designed to strengthen the literacy and numeracy skills of Benalla's youngest learners. We've purchased a set of 40 Comprehension Question Cards and matching storybooks specifically designed for 6 and 7-year-olds. Guided by research in the Science of Mathematics, we've also developed hands-on kits to introduce key mathematical concepts such as number, shape, size, length, weight, and time - combining exploration with direct instruction.

Back to School vouchers I \$30,000

The Back to School program provides timely financial support for students to purchase educational items like uniforms, bags and books. For 20 years we have distributed Back to School vouchers in conjunction with the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal

(FRRR). At the scheduled conclusion of the FRRR funding in 2024, Tomorrow Today sought to continue the program locally. This was made possible through several funding sources including The June Canavan Foundation, Community Underwriting, the Rotary Club of Benalla, Olive Tree Op Shop and from the generous support of local business and individual donors.

400 vouchers valued at \$75 each were given to local schools to distribute to families to help meet the cost of school essentials.

Support for groups and organisations | \$62,902

Tomorrow Today supports a range of local projects each year through our Annual Grants Program and Stepping Stones Grants. Both programs are funded by income from the Community Fund.

Our grants support projects that align with two major themes:

- Building a stronger, more connected community.
- Improving social and educational outcomes for Benalla's children and young people.

Our Annual Grants Program awards grants of up to \$5,000 to fund community groups and organisations to deliver projects that build skills, strength and resilience in Benalla. Annual grants open in February each year and are announced in June. In 2025, we awarded \$52,702 to fund 13 community projects. This represents our largest ever distribution of funds.

Stepping Stones Grants of up to \$2,000 are available for community projects throughout the year. This year we awarded \$10,200 to fund six projects.

ANNUAL GRANTS

AUSTRALIAN INDIAN HISTORICAL SOCIETY The Legacy of Siva Singh I \$5,000

The Australian Indian Historical Society creates educational resources to share the rich history and contributions of Indian communities in Australia to help reduce racism and promote social cohesion. This grant will fund a book about the life of Siva Singh, an Indian immigrant to Benalla, focussing on his deep connections to the Benalla community and significant contribution to the rights of immigrants in Australia. The book will be distributed to local schools, libraries and community centres to foster learning and awareness of the multicultural history of our region.

BADDAGINNIE COMMUNITY INC Disco for Kids I \$2,600

In response to feedback from local young people seeking opportunities to socialise locally, Baddaginnie Community Inc will host a disco for young people aged 10-16. The funds from this grant will help to fund a DJ, refreshments and security for the event as well as the purchase of a first aid kit for the Baddaginnie Jubilee Hall.

BENALLA HOMELESSNESS RESPONSE GROUP

Community Upskilling Project | \$5,000

The Benalla Homelessness Response Group was established to provide support for people in Benalla and district who are experiencing homelessness, disadvantage and crisis. This grant will contribute to training up to 50 community volunteers in Safe Talk Suicide Prevention and Accidental Counsellor programs. The training will build significant capacity within the Benalla community in an area of crucial need.



BENALLA SCOUTS

Country Women's Association Garden Project | \$5,000

Scouting is all about the healthy development of young people, preparing them for a constructive and active life. Part of this is learning important skills to help build strong communities. This grant will help to fund the rejuvenation of the front garden of the Benalla CWA Hall. The collaborative project will not only make the garden more appealing. it will encourage everyone involved in the project to learn new skills like landscaping, soil maintenance and preparation, and how to install an irrigation system.

BENALLA SWIMMING CLUB SONR Training Headsets | \$2,425

For many children, especially those who are hearing impaired or with ADHD, a noisy pool environment can be a difficult place to learn. SONR training headsets allow swim coaches to speak directly to individual swimmers while they are in the water via a radio transmitter. Benalla Swimming Club will use the grant funding to purchase a set of SONR training headsets to ensure all members have access to coaching that meets their individual needs.

BENALLA P-12 COLLEGE

Beyond Books | \$3,000

The Beyond Books project supports students with resources that help them manage challenging feelings and life situations. Funding will go towards books selected by the school's wellbeing team to suit different ages and needs. These books will be gifted to students and families across all three campuses.

BERNARD BRIGGS KINDERGARTEN

Outdoor Play Equipment | \$3,786

With the increase in children attending three-year-old kinder, the need for high quality learning equipment is vital. This grant will fund the purchase of a range of new outdoor equipment to support the children's gross motor skills and improve their physical wellbeing.



EDSPACE

Rethink Resources - Resale Enterprise 1\$5,000

EdSpace provides family centred support services in health and education for people with a disability and their families living in rural Victoria. The Resale Enterprise will resell food sourced from the local food network that would otherwise go to waste. The project will not only have environmental benefits, it will provide low-cost produce for community members, help students learn vital retail and administration skills, and provide a framework for them to participate in community activities.

LIFE CHURCH BENALLA

Life Play Outdoor Yard | \$5,000

Life Play is a free community playgroup. It aims to provide a fun, friendly, relaxed and safe environment for children and families to gather and connect. The grant funds will be used to create an outdoor play space that includes a sandpit, grass and soft-fall area for climbing and jumping.





MUNRO AVENUE PRESCHOOL

Outdoor Preschool Equipment | \$4,991

Outdoor play provides the opportunity for children to engage their senses. It supports imaginative play and builds children's gross motor development. This grant will enable the preschool to build on and upgrade its range of outdoor play equipment to cater to the diverse learning needs of all children at the centre.

NORTH EAST MULTICULTURAL ASSOCIATION

Children's Week Activities | \$3,400

North East Multicultural Association (NEMA) is a pivotal advocate for multiculturalism within our region, supporting new and established migrant and refugee communities across five Local Government Areas, including Benalla. As part of national Children's Week, NEMA will be hosting a range of engaging activities for kindergarten and early-school-aged children.



RIDE AVENUE KINDERGARTEN

Small World, Big Imaginations | \$5,000

Small World play nurtures children's creativity and cognitive, physical, language and social skills through imaginative play. Using small toys and props, children can create detailed mini-worlds which help them connect with and reflect upon what they see, hear, feel and think in their everyday lives. This grant will fund new resources to encourage the awe and wonder in children's play experiences.

ST JOSEPH'S PRIMARY SCHOOL

Indigenous Garden Project | \$2,500

The Indigenous Garden Project will provide a culturally rich space for students to learn about Indigenous heritage, native plants, and environmental sustainability. The garden will feature a Welcome to Country area, native flora, and student-created Indigenous art pieces in collaboration with the school's Visual Arts program. This initiative aims to enhance student involvement in the local Indigenous community and strengthen connections with the Benalla Aboriginal Garden.

STEPPING STONES **GRANTS**

BENALLA ART GALLERY

Benalla Festival Fringe Events I \$2,000

This grant supported two community social activities as part of the broader Benalla Festival. "Deep Soulful Sweats" an immersive performance event for adults to experience improvised movement; and, "Stage School" a theatre making workshop for children aged 7-12, to explore aspects of theatre production.

BENALLA FLEXIBLE LEARNING CENTRE

The Aboriginal Yarning Circle and Dreaming Garden Artwork and Workshop | \$2,000

This grant funded an intensive 2-day workshop facilitated by Taungarung artist Sammy Trist. This formed part of a larger project designed to strengthen students' connection to self, community and country. The finished artwork hangs next to the centre's yarning circle and represents the Aboriginal totems of our region.

BENALLA HEALTH

Mighty Movers I \$1,200

As part of the collaborative RESPOND project, Deakin University, Tomorrow Today, Benalla Health and Benalla Rural City Council worked together with the community to identify barriers to healthy eating and physical activity for children. This grant supported two Mighty Movers sessions which provided guided physical activities and games for children aged 6-12 years old.

BENALLA RURAL CITY COUNCIL

Kids Zone @ the Benalla Street Art Festival | \$2,000

The Kids Zone at the 2025 Benalla Street Art Festival was a free hands-on creative space facilitated by local artists and volunteers. It included a range of artistic workshops, crafts and educational activities centered on the Growling Grass Frog.

CARERS AND PARENTS SUPPORT GROUP FASD Information and Training Day I \$1,000

Benalla's Parents and Carers Support Group has been providing information, advocacy,

referral and support to carers, parents and families for 35 years. This grant funded a training and information day about Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) to raise awareness about diagnosis and available support services.

GOULBURN AND NORTH EAST ARTS ALLIANCE

Mural Music I \$2,000

As part of Children's Week activities, Mural Music provided art-making, music and dance activities for children and families. The grant funded immersive creative arts experiences for children to broaden their connection to others within their community.





EDUCATION BENALLA PROGRAM

OVERVIEW

The Education Benalla Program (EBP) began in 2010 to address the clear indicators that Benalla's children and young people were not achieving similar educational outcomes to other students in Victoria. Now in its fifteenth year, the EBP is an integral part of the fabric of Benalla, working to ensure that Benalla's children and young people have the chance to thrive in learning and in life.

Our Early Years programs empower parents to see themselves as their child's first and most important ongoing educator. We also deliver literacy, numeracy and oral language programs within local preschools and schools to directly support young children's learning. We provide funding for school and community activities helping to break down barriers so that every child can take part in educational and extra-curricular opportunities.

Our Future Work programs encourage young people aged 11–19 to raise their aspirations, grow in confidence, and develop the skills they'll need for further education and employment. Working closely with schools and other organisations, we open doors to career exploration, leadership opportunities, and pathways for young people to connect, contribute, and be heard.

We work in partnership with families, preschools, schools, and a wide network of government, business and community organisations. With the support of more than 80 dedicated program volunteers, these connections create strong networks and opportunities that improve the learning and developmental outcomes of Benalla's children and young people.

Together we strive to ensure that:

- every Benalla child starts school ready to learn,
- numeracy and literacy are measurably improved,
- · student wellbeing is improved, and
- community aspirations for children's education are raised.

Anganya - Deepening cultural connection

In Term 3, 2024 we launched Anganya, a pilot program in partnership with Shepparton's Ganbina, to support the learning of Benalla's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from Prep through to Year 12. In its first year the program has successfully engaged with 70% of Benalla's students who identify as Indigenous.


Anganya is based on Ganbina's highly successful Jobs4U2 program and is delivered in part by local Elders and Aboriginal community members.

There are four key elements the pilot is focusing on:

- Education providing direct, one-to-one and small group tutoring in key learning areas including activities that support cultural connection.
- 2. Employment and Training supporting students to secure part-time work, strengthen their employability, and improve their money management skills.
- 3. Driving reducing the barriers to employment by supporting students to obtain their driver's licence.
- 4. Financial Support sharing the cost with families for things like school shoes, school fees and laptops.

2024/25 PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

ConnectParent

Trained volunteer Community Connectors work with families through pregnancy and the first two years of their child's life, supporting them to thrive in the critical first 1,000 days. The program's first year highlighted how every connection is unique but equally strong. For some families, Community Connectors are a bridge to access essential services; for others their Connector becomes a trusted part of their support team during childbirth and in the very early days of parenthood.



Benalla Imagination Library

Launched in 2024, the Benalla Imagination Library is a part of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library scheme. Currently, 72% of children aged 0-2 in Benalla Rural City, have been registered to receive a free, high quality, age-appropriate book in the mail each month. Resources are also provided to help families engage with the book in ways that promote language development and early literacy.

PEEP (Parents Early Education Partnership)

PEEP currently reaches around 80% of Benalla families with children aged 0-5. The program offers a welcoming and supportive space where parents can connect, share experiences, and learn from one another. Children take part in engaging play and craft activities that build early literacy, numeracy, language, social, and motor skills. Parents join guided discussions on child development and parenting, and together families enjoy songs, books, rhymes, and learning games. Regular outings and family events help strengthen community connections. This year, we have continued to offer evening sessions and groups designed especially for dads.

Early Years Support program

For families experiencing geographical isolation, health, or accessibility issues we provide an in-home Early Years Support program. This program helps primary caregivers develop strategies to support their child's learning and navigate the challenges of parenting. Our trained early years specialist works with families to build and maintain important connections and supports them to transition their child from home to preschool, and from preschool to primary school.

Creative Movement

In our Creative Movement classes, a trained facilitator runs fun, energetic lessons that incorporate music, movement and singing. In hour-long sessions each week of the school term, children aged from 18 months to 5 years (along with their parent or caregiver) develop their gross motor skills while exploring their creativity and improving their emotional expression.

Preschool screening

In partnership with local preschools, we offer pre-literacy, pre-numeracy and oral language screening for all 4-year-old children. This year we have reached more than 90% of Benalla's 4-year-old children. At the conclusion of the screening we provide parents with support to further develop these skills through everyday activities at home, and preschool teachers with play-based resources and activities to expand children's knowledge.

Kinder Pals

Kinder Pals are trained volunteers who help preschool children build their early literacy and numeracy skills. Working in small groups within Benalla's preschools, Kinder Pals read picture books and engage the children in story retelling, picture description and rich conversation.

Kinder Immersion

The six-week Kinder Immersion program was offered to children who would be starting primary school in 2025 but had been identified by their educators as needing a little extra help to be 'school-ready'. Working with children in small groups at three of Benalla's preschools, our staff employed play-based activities to enhance their pre-literacy, prenumeracy and oral language skills to prepare them for school entry.

Great Start to School

Great Start to School aims to empower parents to transition their child into their first year of school with confidence. Over two sessions, parents and caregivers learn about the importance of before and after school routines, strategies to promote physical and emotional independence, and how everyday activities can help their child's pre-literacy and pre-numeracy skill development.

Prep Immersion

In conjunction with Benalla P-12 College Prep teachers, our staff identified students who had commenced school but were not 'switched on' for learning. Over eight weeks in Term 2, we worked with students four times a week building the skills they need to 'catch-up' to their peers. Throughout the program, staff regularly communicated with class teachers and parents about student progress and supporting their learning.

Benalla Early Years Network

The Benalla Early Years Network brings together representatives from local preschools and schools, family support, health, disability and welfare services. Tomorrow Today coordinated three networking and two professional development events.

Participate! Funding

Participating in activities outside of school helps children and young people build connections, increase their sense of belonging and improve physical and mental wellbeing. This in turn can boost children's enthusiasm for learning and engagement at school. Our Participate! Funding provides financial support for children from families with a pension or health care card to join local clubs and participate in regular out-of-school activities. This year we have had a 30% increase in the uptake of this assistance reflecting the increased cost-of-living pressure families are experiencing.

Individual funding assistance

Building aspiration and exploring what's possible is the cornerstone of our Year 5 & 6 Careers activities. Students participated in financial literacy sessions, Dream Seeds skills and strengths workshops, visited learning institutions and workplaces and, at our Living Libraries event met 19 local professionals from a range of industries. These experiences broaden their understanding of the world of work and help them identify their own strengths and interests.

Motiv8

Motiv8 launched in Term 2, 2025 and was developed in response to our research indicating that Year 8 students were disengaging with peers and their community. Over three school terms, small groups of Year 8 students meet fortnightly to work on a project or participate in hands-on activities designed to help them develop their collaborative skills. In its inaugural term, 12 students joined the program. The students visited Estia Health to record the life stories of the residents or participated in workshops facilitated by Benalla SES to develop emergency plans.

Full Impact Squad

A youth-led program for young people aged 11 to 19, Full Impact Squad is a community approach to empower Benalla's young people to become a confident voice representing their peers in our region. This year the Squad participated in regular workshops with local Council and the community to help inform local government strategy in the youth space. They also planned and implemented community events to support the issues they have identified as meaningful to them, in particular youth mental health and environmental sustainability. This year the Squad has experienced significant growth, with a membership increase of 46%.

Connect9

Connect9 was one of the first programs
Tomorrow Today implemented. Now in its
fourteenth year, it is as important as ever
for Benalla's young people. This community

Hands on Trades and Careers Expo

Hands on Learning

Live4Life

Live4Life is the only mental health education and youth suicide prevention model designed especially for rural communities. Distance from major centres, lack of reliable transport options and reduced economic circumstances mean that country students often struggle to explore all available options for further study. Our University Bus Trips help young people to see universities in action, visiting lecture theatres, recreation and accommodation facilities. This year we've facilitated students from Benalla P-12 College, FCJ College, EdSpace and Benalla Flexible Learning Centre to visit LaTrobe University Bendigo, RMIT and Australian Catholic University in Melbourne.

Year 12 Scholarships

To help reduce the barriers regional students face to access tertiary studies, Tomorrow Today awards \$2,000 scholarships to Year 12 students who are intending to pursue further education at university, TAFE or in a trade. 
- Diploma of Sport and Business at SEDA College

So, it's not surprising to learn that they both work in caring professions - Jake is a disability support worker and Bre is a mental health advocate. Earlier this year, Bre started volunteering with Tomorrow Today in the PEEP program and it wasn't long before Jake joined her.

The environment's great. JOEL AND IAN



Connect9 holds a special place in the hearts of Joel Spencer and Ian Gonzaga. When they moved to Benalla in 2022, it didn't take long for them to learn about the teen mentoring program that has become a fixture of the Education Benalla Program. "We heard about the program when we first moved here and the next year we volunteered to be mentors," said Ian. "At first I was a bit nervous, but I didn't need to be. It's like anything, you just need to be present. You're there with your mentee and the group and you're going to have fun!

Seeing the different dynamics within the group, the kids interacting with each other and with us. I don't know what it is, but it just works and that's just what it's been like each year."

For Joel it's seeing the teenagers grow in confidence that makes the program memorable; "One of my mentees, on the first day he was in the corner by himself, kicking the ground, not talking to anyone. By the end he was talking with the other kids. Every time I see him now he's super confident, he comes to say hello. I think Connect9 made the difference for him."

Alex Ross, our Youth Engagement Coordinator was full of praise for the pair; "We couldn't ask for better mentors than Joel and Ian. They totally embrace the program and bring a wealth of life experience that their mentees and the whole group really benefit from."

NEVILLE AND LINDA



Neville and Linda Scriven have been Benalla residents for a number of years and are well connected in the community through schools, preschools and the Rotary club. In 2022 Neville became a Connect9 mentor, for him the program is a chance to support local young people; "Each year is different. Sometimes you bond with your mentee really quickly and other years it takes a little more time. Either way there's a trust that grows during the whole program. I think they know that you're trying to support them as much as you can."

In 2025 Linda joined the program too; "Each time Neville came home from Connect9 he'd tell me something different and about how rewarding it was. So, this year I said I'd give it a go."

The most memorable part of her first program involved law enforcement; "The Scavenger Hunt was a lot of fun although I got pulled over by police (as I was) dressed as a zombie running down the road to catch up to my mentee!"

Despite her tangle with the law, Linda was keen to encourage others to volunteer; "This is very local. These are our kids and it is only a small amount of time to give to make a bit of a difference in your community and that is a really lovely thing."



The objective of Tomorrow Today
Foundation (company name - Tomorrow
Today A Foundation for Rural Community
Development), is to enable the people of
Benalla and district to create a stronger,
more resilient and prosperous rural
community.

The company is trustee of the Tomorrow Today Public Fund which provides tax deductibility for all gifts over \$2. The Public Fund and the Open Fund (for supporters not needing a tax deduction) together make up Benalla's Community Fund. During the year, funds were raised to continue building the Community Fund and grants from Community Fund income were made to benefit the district.

Tomorrow Today Foundation purchased the commercial property at 66-68 Nunn Street, Benalla, in 2017. Ownership provides a secure base for all Tomorrow Today's community activities and a long-term rental income stream from leased offices. Costs are kept to a minimum thanks to substantial probono property management, legal and other support, along with the installation of solar panels.



TOMORROW TODAY EDUCATION FOUNDATION

The objective of Tomorrow Today Education Foundation is to reduce the level of social disadvantage in Benalla and district.

During the year, the company worked with families, schools and the wider community to deliver the Education Benalla Program. The Program responds to the multiple effects of high levels of social disadvantage to improve the educational outcomes of Benalla's young people. Our staff coordinate and deliver more than 20 different activities that make up the Program, supported by generous grant funding from beyond Benalla.

Generous grant funding from Benalla and beyond has supported the Education Benalla Program since it began in 2010. A full list of this year's supporters can be found on pages 42 & 43.


